- **√Types of resources**
- **√How many sources**
- **√Length of paper**
- **✓Topic direction**
- √Type of paper
- **✓Style or paper format**
- **√**Assignment due date
- **√**Additional requirements

Topic Development

- Narrow:
 - o General: Careers, Education
 - **Narrowed: Business Careers, Postsecondary Education**
 - More Specific: Retail Management, Community college education
 - Narrow further by education, location, experience, gender, etc.
- Broaden:
 - Sometimes your topic is too specific
- Questions to ask:
 - o Why?
 - o How?
 - o What?

Brainstorm Search Words and/or Phrases

Keyword vs. Subject

• Keyword:

- Searches for the specific word or phrase
- Subject:
 - Entire book or article will discuss the subject

Suggestions

- Don't simply begin your research
- Make a list
- Write down suggestions
- Synonyms
- Abbreviations
- Alternative spellings
- Etc.

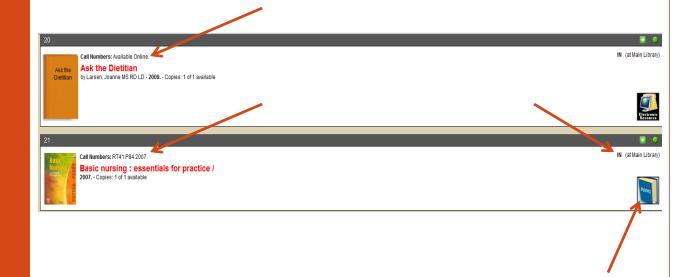

FIND ARTICLES USING ELECTRONIC DATABASES

Popular vs. Scholarly

Popular:

- ✓ Photographs
- ✓ Advertisements
- ✓ General Public
- ✓ Available at checkout
- ✓ Published weekly or monthly

Scholarly:

- ✓ In-depth articles
- ✓ Audience: scholars, researchers, or professionals
- ✓ Published monthly or quarterly
- ✓ As known as: Peer Reviewed

Database Provides:

- o Full text articles
- Abstract
- Citation

 - o General
 - Subject or Specific

Database Searching

Search Types

• Basic:

One search box

Advanced:

- Multiple search boxes
- Limiters
 - × Year
 - **x** Scholarly
 - × Full text

Booleans

• <u>And</u>:

- o Combines search words
- Results are more specific

• Or:

- Searches both separately
- More results

• <u>Not</u>:

 Eliminates a specific topic from results

Using the Web

The Web

Strengths:

- Current information
- Professional organizations
- Blogs
- Job Hunting
- Travel Services
- Shopping

Weaknesses:

- Inaccurate
- Biased
- Hard to find information
- Hard to evaluate creditibility
- Not organized
- Not an academic creditble source

Library Electronic Resources

Strengths:

- Library pays for access
- Information chosen and reviewed by database hosts and librarians
- Organized

Weaknesses:

 Information may not be as current

- Amount of information may be limited
- Access is restricted



S.T.A.R.T.

- ✓ **SCOPE** Coverage
- ✓ **TREATMENT** Accuracy, Objectivity
- ✓ **AUTHORITY** Identified?
- ✓ **RELEVANCE** Coverage, Suitability
- ✓ **TIMELINESS** Current

Evaluating Information

- o Information found from databases or web
- Harder to evaluate internet resources
- Library resources have been evaluated for you

Citing Sources

CITE YOUR SOURCES AND AVOID PLAGIARISM



- 1. Use your own ideas
- Use ideas of others sparingly
- 3. Taking notes: include complete citation
- 4. Use quotation marks when directly stating words from someone else
- 5. Write short draft without using any notes

Plagiarism

- Buy or use a term paper written by someone else
- Cut and paste passages from web, book or articles without proper citation
- Use words or ideas of another person
- Paraphrasing
- Not a display of academic integrity!
