Dear constituents,

Thank you for taking the time to explore the 2023 Community Report. It is designed to bring you up to speed on the happenings at the college in the 2022-2023 academic year and the college's progress toward meeting its mission. This publication contains a wealth of information about the college, but if you still have questions, I would encourage you to contact the Board of Trustees through the trustees website at trustees.bartonccc.edu. Before you turn the page, here are a few highlights from the last year:

PROGRAM UPDATE

Barton is constantly reevaluating its programs and services to ensure the college remains relevant to the community's needs and continues to add and expand programs to meet those needs. The most recent additions include dance instruction management and expanded options for welding. Some existing programs have made their way to additional campus sites, including early childhood education at Fort Riley and Fort Leavenworth, and scales technician is slated to make its way to the Grandview Plaza campus in the coming year.

AGRICULTURE AND TRANSPORTATION COMPLEX

Considerable progress has been made on the new Agriculture and Transportation Complex. With the outer exterior completed and work on the inside moving ahead, we are looking forward to the planned opening of the complex in Fall 2024. The new facility will allow the college to expand current agriculture offerings and add a new farm machinery service tech program through its existing partnership with CNH Industrial.

HIGH SCHOOL OPPORTUNITIES

With the approval of a new tuition rate for Kansas high school students in March, the college has expanded its reach for accessible courses for high school students. This has been well received by our local students and across the state. With this new opportunity, in addition to the already established Excel in CTE and the Kansas Promise Act Scholarship, Barton has seen a positive trend in students taking advantage of these affordable options.

FINANCIAL RESPONSIBILITY

The Barton Board of Trustees is pleased to have been able to reduce the mill levy to its lowest point since 2005. Hard work, planning, and commitment on the part of the college faculty, staff, and administration allow us to keep the local tax burden as light as possible, which is a noted priority. Our Grandview Plaza, Fort Riley, and Leavenworth outreach sites also generate revenue to offset the mill levy while providing affordable education opportunities to Soldiers and their families.

PRESIDENTIAL SEARCH

The Board appreciates Dr. Carl Heilman's commitment over the past 17 years to the expansion of high-demand programming and accessible opportunities for all students. With his approaching retirement, the Board will focus its attention during the coming months on the search and selection of the next accomplished leader. 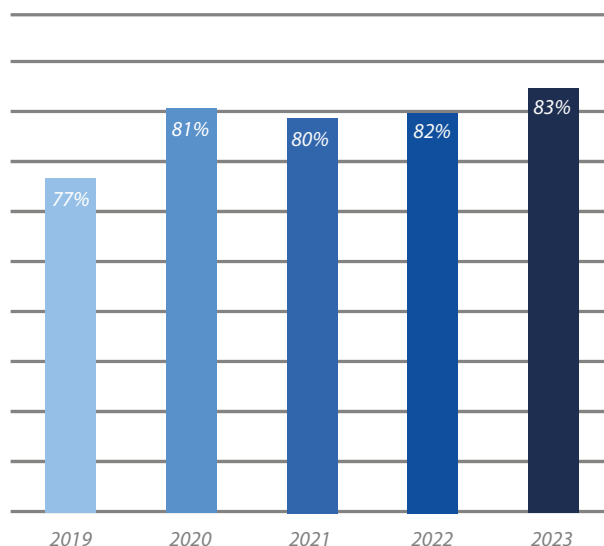

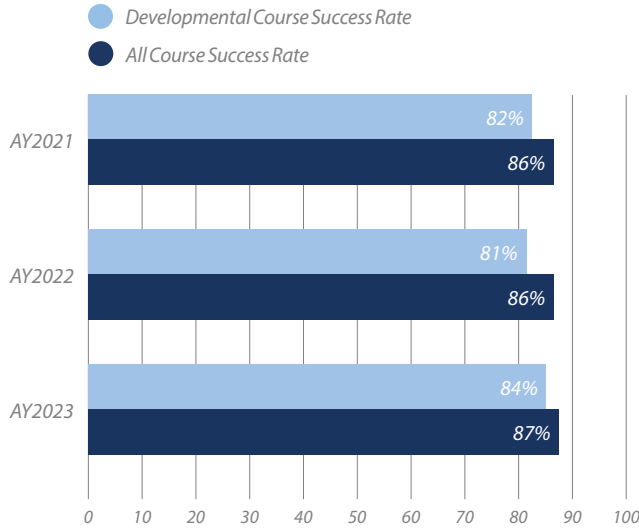

"It was as something I wanted to do for me," he said. "It was very rewarding. I also do a little writing, so I thought it would help my writing ability."

"If I can do it, anybody can do it," he said. "Kristi and Bill at the Center for Adult Ed went above and beyond to assist me in achieving my goal."

WORK PREPAREDNESS SUCCESS STORY

Barton Nursing student Katie Alnor loves helping people and as a nurse, she'll get to do that every day. As a registered nurse she is one step closer to landing her dream job as a pediatric intensive care unit (PICU) nurse.

"I love working with kids and being able to share my energy with their little personalities," she said. "As a PICU nurse, I will be able to provide almost one-on-one care with these sick kiddos and be able to care for their specific needs and be able to be a part of their recovery journey."

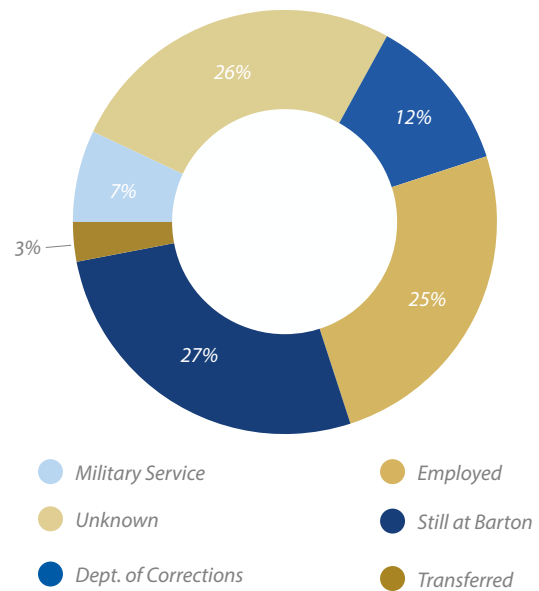
Alnor said Barton's hands-on approach, which includes allowing them to work alongside practicing nurses in clinical settings, really prepares students for the real world.

"Getting to work in different healthcare settings throughout my two years has been very helpful in helping me pick out a specialty that interests me," she said. "When starting nursing school, I had a specialty that I swore I was going into. After going through clinical rotations, I found out that the specialty that I wanted to work in originally probably wasn't what was best suited for me."

Barton's program provides opportunities to use state-of-the-art equipment and a team of instructors that is large enough to provide time for one-on-one focus for students when needed. "I had the opportunity to learn from amazing instructors who taught certain subjects based on their personal experiences and their chosen specialties," she said. "It was very helpful to be able to practice using equipment before going to clinical sites. We spent some time learning different procedures that we would be expected to perform at clinical sites."

NEW PROGRAM FEATURES

Dance Instruction and Management

Maddy Hayden-Rideaux is the head coach of the Great Bend High School Dance Team, and she owns Be Dance Studios in downtown Great Bend. She's truly living her dreams and built a large part of her dancing foundation right in her hometown at Barton Community College.

"I am so grateful for my time at Barton," she said. "My coach taught and challenged me in ways I hadn't been before. Attending the National Dance Alliance college nationals in Daytona, Fla., really opened my eyes to a whole new perspective on making dance a career. My second semester, I also joined the Barton Dance Theatre Program under Danika Bielek."

Being a studio owner and a coach, Hayden-Rideaux said she learned so much during her time at Barton that helped prepare her for her professional endeavors in the world of dance.

Barton recently added its Dance Instruction and Management Program to provide even more direct focus on the business aspect of those wanting to make dance a career. Barton Dance Instructor and Fine and Performing Arts Coordinator Danika Bielek said she always wanted to offer this program as a way to bring the performance and business sides of dance together for students.

"Learning dance techniques and how to perform well is one aspect of dance, and I think it's the one that most people are familiar with," she said. "However, there is a whole other side to running a studio, educating, or coaching at a high level, and I wanted to give dancers interested in these career paths the full set of tools they need to succeed in any dance-related career." Hayden-Rideaux said she looks forward to teaching and coaching new generations of dancers for many years to come.



Barton and Medicalodges Apprenticeship Academy

Barton Community College has partnered with Medicalodges, Inc. to offer a new apprenticeship program blending classroom instruction with paid on-the-job training. Medicalodges Academy: Pathway to Learning and Earning will allow students to train in areas such as Registered Nursing (RN), Licensed Practical Nursing (LPN), Certified Nurse Aide (CNA), and Dietary Manager.

Barton Vice President of Instruction Elaine Simmons, said Barton has served area businesses and local industries for years to support workforce development. With the addition of registered apprenticeship programs in the area, the College can extend additional support through on-the-job training, related technical instruction, and industry-recognized credentials.

“The College is offering its support to organizations seeking to use apprenticeships as a tool for recruiting and retaining employees,” she said. “In addition to technical training, apprenticeships can also offer mentorships and wage progression to support employees.”



Medicalodges was chosen as the first partnership to launch the academy because of its commitment to offering the community an opportunity to learn while they earn. Medicalodges Executive Vice President, Shannon Lagers said that they are not only committed to providing quality healthcare but also career and advancement opportunities to their employees and those that live in their communities.

“We know the quality of the services we provide is dependent upon a sufficient and skilled workforce,” she said. “Medicalodges Academy: Learn while you Earn is an avenue to develop that workforce, and we are excited to collaborate with Barton in offering this workforce opportunity.”

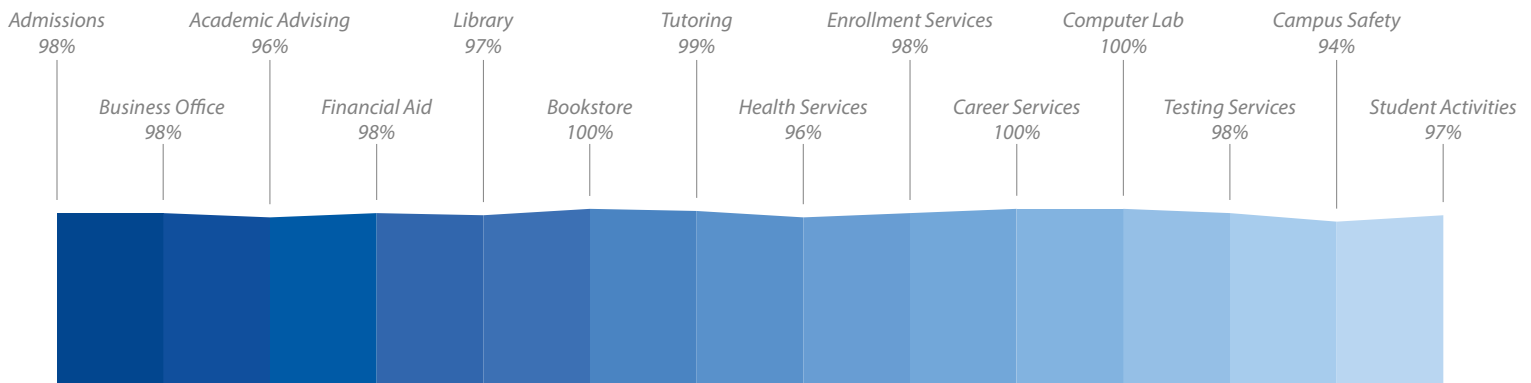

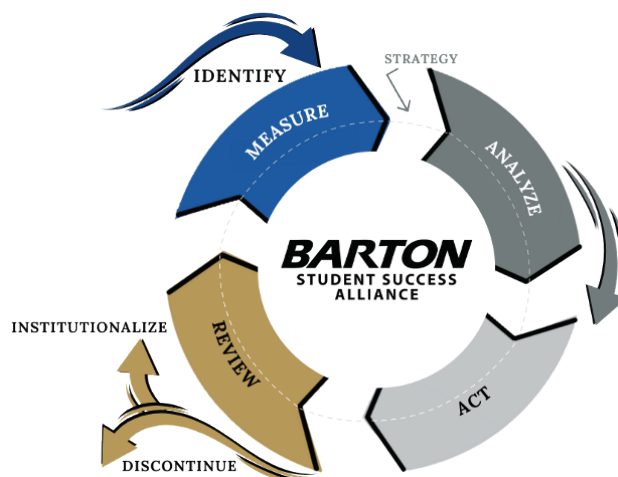

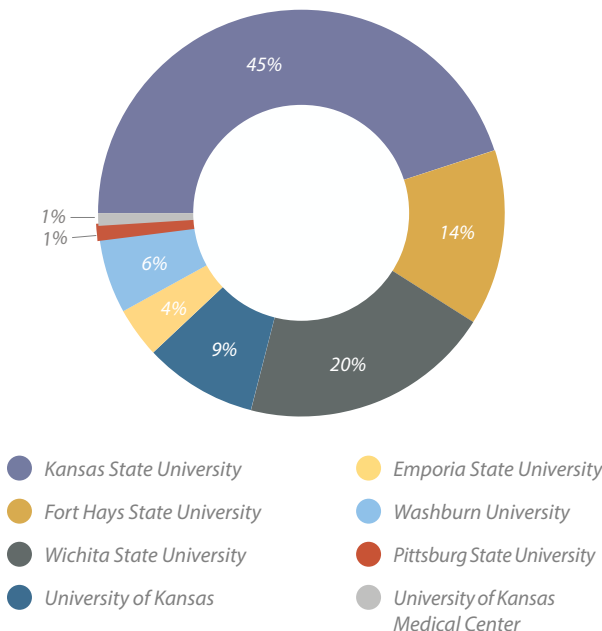


TRANSFER TESTIMONIAL: HALEY TROYER

ACADEMIC INTEGRITY

Barton has joined institutions nationwide in placing a priority on promoting Academic Integrity. The proactive fight teams up against the myriad of “contract cheating” organizations that circumvent the process of real learning. In addition to using technology to enhance instructors’ ability to ensure a student’s work is their own, an awareness campaign about the importance of academic integrity was continued during the 2022-2023 academic year. The following is a sampling of content from that campaign.



COURAGE

Harley Headley has a big dream of travelling the world in pursuit of artistic endeavors. During his journey, he doesn’t let his end goal disrupt his acknowledgment of the importance of academic integrity along the way, specifically the value of courage.

“Growing up, things terrified me left and right,” Headley said. “Even now, I still deal with anxiety and fear. When it comes to being courageous, it’s mind over matter. Showing true courage is just showing you’re not scared. Integrity requires courage, but it’s a little different. It’s the courage to fail, to misunderstand, and to ask for help. Doing those all requires courage, considering it’s easier just to cheat. Being courageous isn’t easy, but it does pay off.”



FAIRNESS

Molly Norris knows what it takes to be a top-tier athlete on the volleyball court, and as an ambassador for the academic integrity virtue of fairness, she’s learned that many of the same positive ideas that guide her on the court, also apply in the classroom.

“Holding yourself accountable to the value of fairness is crucial,” Norris said. “As an athlete, I understand that there are no cutting corners in finding success. If I want to be better, I need to practice, and if I want to be stronger, I need to lift, etc. As a student, if I want to improve, I need to put the work in to see the results instead of trying to find alternate easier ways. Understanding that every student is going through the same experience (homework assignments, tests, projects, etc.) as you should push people to maintain integrity because it is not fair for students to do the same work, but some people maintain academic integrity while others don’t.”



TRUST

Jonathan Beers was not only an exceptional student, but also, a member of the Barton swim team. He graduated this past spring proud of the legacy he left behind as someone who exhibited academic integrity in practice as well as being the ambassador for the value of trust.

“I am so glad to represent trust because that has been something that I have always valued in my life,” Beers said. “From a very young age, my father taught me the importance of trust in my life and how people will trust you to make the right decision if you are the right person. I have developed this trait with a lot of my teachers so that when something goes wrong, they can trust me to try my hardest still. Academic integrity is important to me because I desire to be proud of the work and foundation that I am building in an honest way.”



RESPONSIBILITY

Marina Clark is described as “thoughtful, hard-working, and committed to furthering her education.” As the representative for responsibility, she displayed this commitment through her participation in the development of a student seminar on academic integrity and served as a student representative in Barton’s Academic Integrity Council, providing a student’s perspective. Marina attended the Fort Riley campus and is currently attending Kansas State University.

“Academic integrity is important to me because it helps me hold myself to a specific set of standards,” Clark said. “Responsibility plays a really big role in both my academic life and personal life! In my academic life, I really try to complete my assignments before they are due. I also try to let my professors know if there is anything that I’m struggling with or something that isn’t working for me. In my personal life, I’m a para-educator, so I work with kids in special education. I really try to teach the students I work with how important it is to turn in assignments on time and speak up for things they don’t understand. I think responsibility is a super important value to have because, without it, there would be no accountability in life.”



RESPECT

Tionna Caldwell has had a long journey to her current role as a Barton student at Fort Leavenworth. She went directly into the workforce after high school and life changes led her to Leavenworth, where she could jump back into her education through LSEC classes as a Department of Defense employee. This journey led her to know that the value of respect goes beyond her personal endeavors. She believes it is imperative to exhibit and reciprocate it not only as she finishes her education, but also as she pursues her career as a dental hygienist.

“Academic integrity is important to me personally because doing the work is a fundamental part of the process,” Caldwell said. “Respect plays a role in academic integrity because of how much self-development takes place for students while enrolled. At an educational institution, people have to remain impartial and open-minded. A new platform of ideas will be introduced. Acknowledging our instructors, mentors, and classmates and showing them respect is essential because of their academic influence, and it is at the core of our very own decency. Learning how to enter a conversation with confidence and being selective of the dialogue that comes out of my mouth is evidence of how respect has been productive in my life. I once was enabled by my emotions but with self-development, I have realized respect is a universal language.”

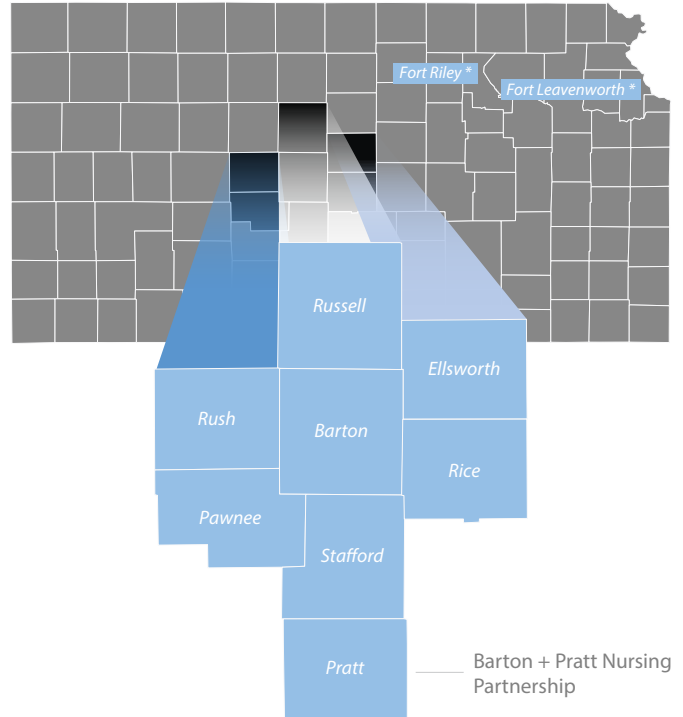
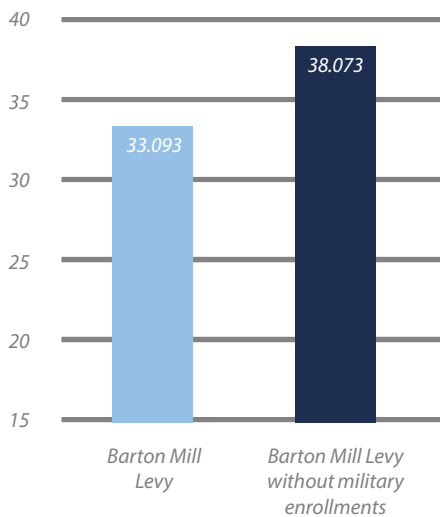

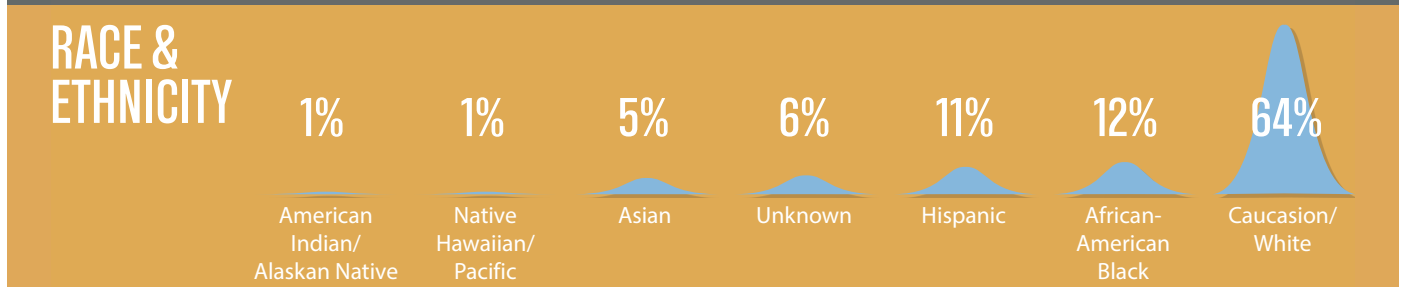
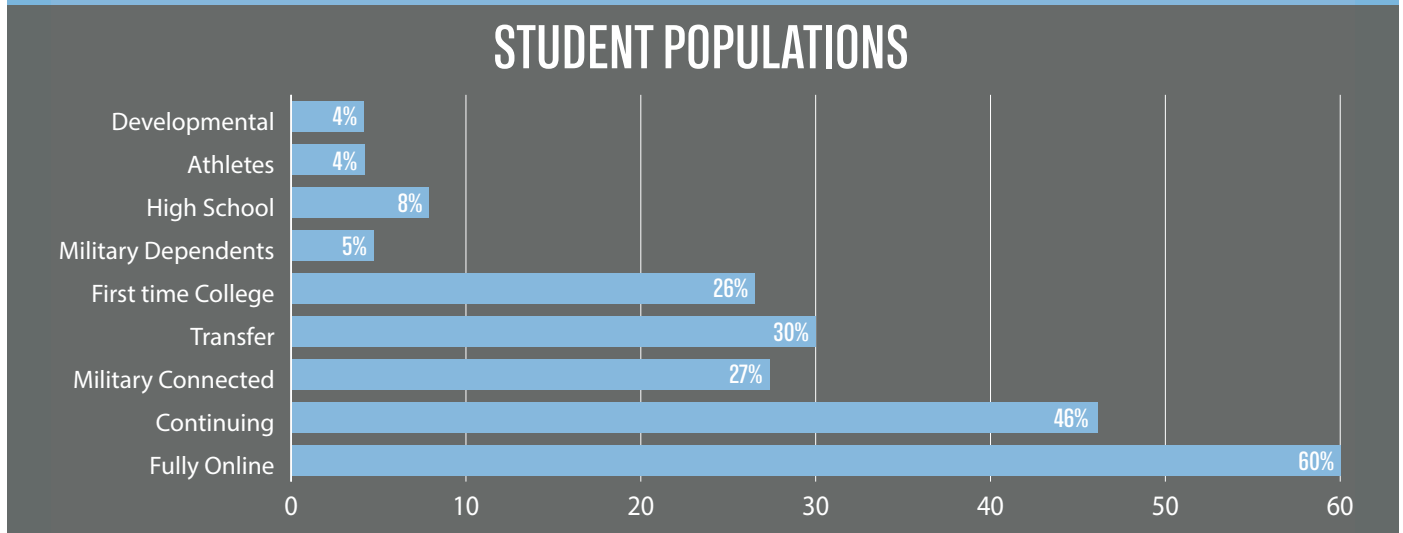
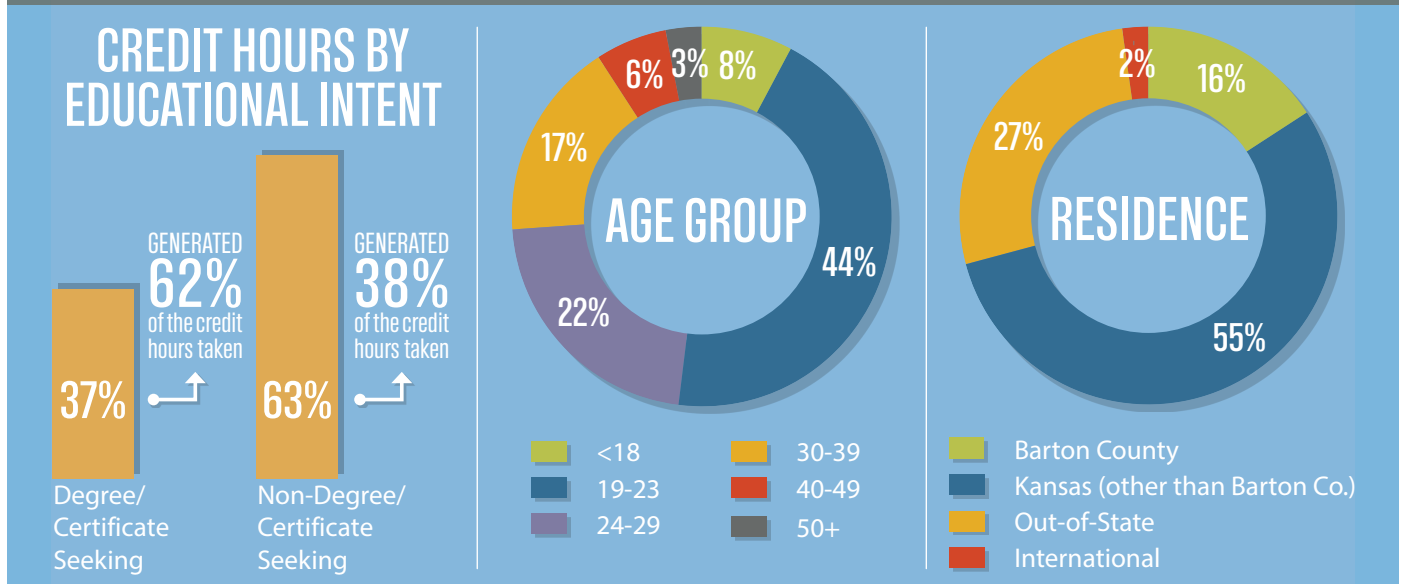
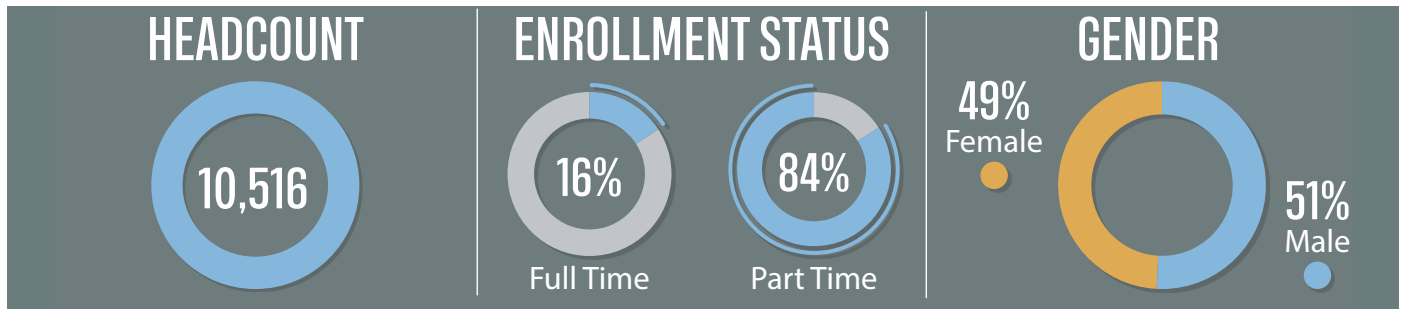

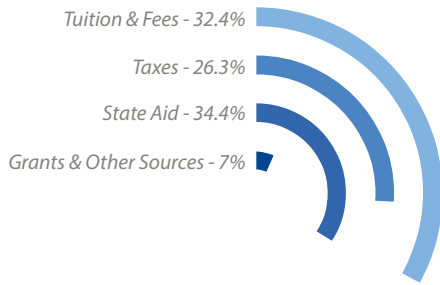

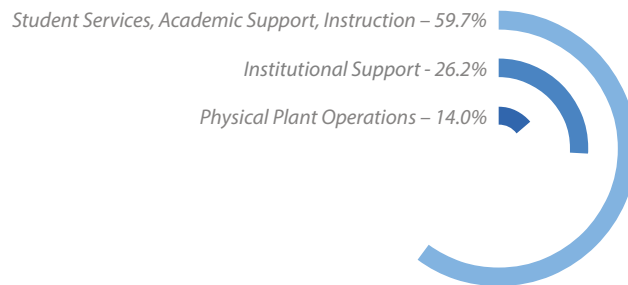
Academic year 2022-2023

The charts above show Barton’s revenue sources and expenditures for Fiscal year 2023. Previously, Barton maintained each of the three primary revenue sources at about a third of the total. Reduced support from state aid has rendered that model unsustainable. The Board of Trustees prioritizes keeping the local tax burden low and prides itself on being able to reduce the mill levy to its lowest point in over 15 years with a strong cash reserve. However, this means the college must rely more on tuition and fees to support operations.

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BARTON ATHLETICS HIGHLIGHTS

The “proof is in the pudding” once again as Barton Athletics has another successful year on and off the playing surface.

For the sixth straight year the Cougars placed in the top three of the NATYCAA Daktronics Cup standings, recognizing Barton’s achievements on the national stage as 14 teams participated at its respective national championship tournament.

In the classroom, 16 Barton athletic teams were recognized by the NJCAA for its academic achievements. Earning a cumulative 3.23 GPA across Barton’s twenty-two athletic teams reporting to the NJCAA list, ten placed among their respective sport’s Top-20 leaderboard highlighted by women’s swimming placing national runner-up and the women’s basketball team placing third out of 110 teams.

In addition to team and department accomplishments, 43% of Barton student-athletes were awarded NJCAA All-Academic honors. Barton’s 106 student-athletes were among those earning a spot on one of three All-Academic teams, 31 landing on the 1st team of perfect 4.0 GPA earners, 33 within the 3.80-3.99 range for 2nd team awards, and 42 earning 3rd team distinction falling in the 3.60-3.79 spectrum.

Featuring twenty-two sport teams, eSports, cheer and dance, and student athletic training program, Barton Athletics provides many opportunities to be successful in competition and in the classroom. For more information, visit BartonSports.com.
