Questions/Comments	<p><u>Should a dispute arise.</u></p> <p>Who is eligible to object? Player? Coach? Parent? Spectator? Anyone? If only player or coach, is that objection open to the opposing team? Will that objection be “public” or can the objection be anonymous or somehow hidden from a FOIA request?</p> <p>If anyone can object, that could become a tool to protest the policy. The school could be overwhelmed with dispute claims. If this were to happen, the investigation becomes the punishment.</p> <p><u>At birth.</u></p> <p>I’m not sure “at birth” is the best language for a policy. The policy is attempting to eliminate the physician declaring a “trans-woman” as a “biological woman” because this seems to be a position that some are taking. I suggest that DNA more accurately gets to the core of this question. The majority of the population that will have either XX or XY chromosomes. There is a small minority of people (0.018% of the population) (https://pubmed.ncbi.nlm.nih.gov/12476264/) with chromosomes other than XX or XY. This group is commonly known as intersex.</p> <p>The final statement about an inability to determine biological sex resulting in a default to men’s teams is good and defensible language.
