Instructional Comics

Comics that use a structured format to teach or train the reader.

A genre in which conceptual and functional information is imparted to an audience with an immediate training need. Instructional comics might include patient education, product manuals, and safety warnings. Instructional comics can be distinguished by the readers' potential ability to instantly understand and accurately follow the actions portrayed in the work. This kind of documentation can also provide instruction that addresses the complexities of topics, audience, content, and context, and helps readers to think and learn.
